- PURPOSE: The Hawkins Family Organization began in 1985. It is conducted by mail and has no scheduled meetings. We want to promote genealogical research on Hawkins families and related lines; to promote and share family history; and to strengthen extended family ties.
- NEWSLETTERS: HAWKINS HERITAGE is published three times a year in April, August, and December. We encourage members to contribute material to the editor. It is preferable if you type your material, but if not covenient, please share it anyway. Write your name or initials on each page.
- <u>OUERIES</u>: Members are also encouraged to send queries to the editor. Send enough to cover your questions. Please include siblings whenever possible.
- MEMBERS AND SUBSCRIPTIONS: We began HAWKINS HERITAGE with the hope of identifying the parents of James and Margaret? Hawkins, b. c1765 and 1768, probably in Virginia. Taxation records show that they lived in Stafford CO Virginia from 1793 until 1825, when they migrated to Clark CO Kentucky. One son, John R., married into the Hawkins/Bourne line, which may be a connecting branch of the above James. Because of an apparent need for group research, our publication is now open to descendants of all Hawkins lines.

Individual membership and subscription is \$12 per year. Contributing Membership and subscription is \$20 per year (may vote.)

Subscriptions begin with the April issue. Subscribers during the membership year may receive back issues of the current year or begin with the next year and pay for and single back issues, which are \$4 each. The 1st issue: December 1986; 2nd, April 1987; then three issues per year beginning April 1988 to current.

PEDIGREE SERVICE: You are welcome to send your Hawkins pedigree chart to be checked with our collection. You will be given any additional information which we might have on file, that would match up with your own. Your chart will be filed for possible future contact. Our ancestor files deal mostly with Hawkins of the south and southwest, but we do have some other areas. Cost of this service is \$1 to cover search and photocopies, plus SASE.

Over 150 letters from friends and family told of everything from Kentucky County's Martin-Tolliver Feud to the San Francisco earthquake.

Queries

Hawkins - Talliferro - Bourne - Willis - Morton

In Marsha Moses' research, she found that **Benjamin Hawkins** probably lived in the general area that **Talliferro** lived in Orange County, according to Road Orders 1734-1749. Three **Bourne** men, **John**, **Henry**, and **Andrew** were among others required to keep the road in good repair.

She also received information that **Ann (Nancy) Bourne** was the daughter of **Andrew Bourne** (b.1720, Fredericksburg, VA) and **Jane Morton** b. 1724 in Orange CO VA. Benjamin and Ann migrated to Mercer CO KY. Benjamin was born in King George CO VA 16 June 1738. Ann was born in Culpeper CO VA in 1748 or 1749. Benj.'s father was also **Benjamin Hawkins**, hus/o **Sarah Willis**, and was b c 1716 in Richmond VA. Sarah about 1713 in Richmond.

Marsha thinks that Benj. and Ann are not her ancestors as they moved to KY too early to have been her **Thomas R**. **Hawkins'** parents in Orange County. But neighbors and family often find each other again, so maybe. . . .

Hawkins - Ray

Does anyone have information on: William Ray and Martha Hawkins. This couple took out a marriage bond on 29 April 1815 in Bath County KY. Bondsman: James Hawkins. James Hawkins swore that Martha was 21 or older. The source is Bath County Marriage Bonds, as compiled by Clayton R. Cox.

James Hawkins Ray was born in 1818 in Bath CO KY. Richard Graham is hopes to prove he was son of the above William Ray. He came to Montgomery CO MO before 1840 and was a judge and hotel owner. Please contact Richard Graham: rgraham@socket.net

Hawkins - Bradshaw

Hosea Napoleon Hawkins b 1830 Burke CO TN. He was the son of Aaron Brittain Hawkins and Temperance Bradshaw. . . great grandson of Augustine Hawkins and Elizabeth Henley.

aka: Hosea (one IA census) H. N. in several census and other records. His nickname was Hoss by his Iowa family, and Napoleon. He ran a business in which one of his employees married a daughter.

According to Katherine L. Short of Breckenridge, TX, Hosea probably married his third cousin, Sarah E. Mull before the 1850 Burke CO census. Sarah was born in 1834 in Burke CO, and dau/o Ashby Mull and Mary Brittain who was greatgranddaughter of Johann Peter Mull aka Peter Mull who was born in PA, and moved to NC as a teenager and served twice as sheriff. Ms. Short can verify that Napoleon age 20 and Sarah age 16 were husband and wife, although some online trees have them as siblings. In more than one generation, the NC Hawkins family had several members moving to TN and back again, with some remaining in TN.

Napoleon and Sarah moved to IL after the 1850 census. After ten years and five children, t hey moved to Mahaska CO IA, having more children and remaining until death.

Hawkins - Kester

"William's father was John Hawkins b. 22 Dec 1762 Person NC who married Rebecca Kester (Custard) in 1799 St. Genevieve, Spanish Territory, Louisiana (later Missouri) and died 24 Jul 1840 Washington Co., MO. John's parents were Augustine Hawkins and Elizabeth Henley.

"William went to TX in 1829. He applied for land in Austin's Colony, as shown in the Spanish Archives. Later he fought at San Jacinto. He first married Mary Jane Dickey, then Janet B. Edwards. Some documents indicate a third marriage. Both William and Janet are buried at Early Chapel Cemetery near Lexington, TX."

Frank (F.T.) Hawkins

A note from the secretary of Riverside Cemetery in Brook, IN: Mr. Kyle D. Conrad believes that Frank Hawkins and his wife and at least two children are buried in unmarked graves. "F.T. Hawkins was a furniture dealer and undertaker in the Brook community from the early 1880s until about 1919. His obit states he was born in LaPorte County, IN, but I know his parents were in the Brook area in the late 1860s or 1870s.

"I'm just trying to verify the unmarked burials if possible and trying to locate any living family from this line to let them know where they're at, as I have ample proof that they are buried here. If these names do not correlate, please feel free to pass my name and information on to any other Hawkins researchers that you may be in contact with in the future. Thank you. Kyle D. I have information that Robert's father is Richard and his grandfather is Edward, but I'm not sure it's correct. . .may be speculation.

Hawkins Notes

A Thomas Hawkins was in Orange County Virginia in the 1850 census. Two females are listed with him: Martha P. age 51 and Angelina A. 16. All three were born in Virginia. There is no value for real estate. Thomas is 52. Possibly Martha P. was Thomas' second wife.

In Thomas' son's death notice it says he (the son) "was the only son of Thomas R. Hawkins of Mallory's Ford, Virginia, who was an old line Baptist Preacher, spending the larger portion of his eighty-eight or nine years in the service of his Master pointing lost men to the sufferer of Calvary. . ." A death date in the Religious Herald, Richmond, VA, stated 18th of June 1885.

In 1847, Orange CO, Martha Hawkins sells or makes a deed to Thomas R. Hawkins. 26 Aug 1833, Thomas makes a deed to Curtis Wilhoit. Martha is probably Thomas' wife. He married for the time in 1839 to Martha Bibb. ~ Thank you, Marsha Moses for the above clues.

Does the following add to anyone's search?: The Planters of the Commonwealth includes Arabella Flagship of the Winthrop Fleet - 1 John Hawkins. Not the specific ship but ships were the Ambrose, Talbot, Jewel, Charles, Mayflower, William and Francis, Hopewell, Whale, Success and Trial.

Richard Hawkins age 15 from Lynn on the Susan and Ellen and no date of arrival.

Job Hawkins age 15 from Sudbury Suffolk on Planter from London with Nicholas Terice Master and sailed from London April 10 and arrived Boston June 7. One of the Winthrop Fleet of the James, Elizabeth, Christian, Planter, Hopewell, Rebecca, Elizabeth and Anne.

Robert Hawkins 25 husbandman of Charlestown and Mrs. Mary Hawkins age 24 on the Elizabeth and Anne, Roger Cooper, Master. She sailed the middle of May and arrived at Boston in Midsummer with one hundred and two passengers. Also one of the Winthrop Fleet.

Since Hawkins Heritage was originated by 5 distantly related cousins in 1986, with the hope of identifying the ancestry of James and Margaret Hawkins, born c1765 & 1768, I include this group sheet. That original idea has grown into many Hawkins branches. We hope that in your own research, you will keep a corner of your thoughts open for this particular family. If you find a "spare" James around who may have been born c1765, please let me hear from you. ~ Olyve

James Hawkins – Margaret ? - Sarah Jones

As the King of Siam said, "'Tis a puzzlement." Several years ago, in first attempting to discover the parents of James Hawkins, born c1765 and the surname of his wife Margaret, born c1769, I dismissed the idea that James was a son of William Hawkins and Elizabeth Bourne. Because? I had seen more than once that their son, James, had married a Sarah Jones in 1797.

Inasmuch as James' eldest son, my gr gr gf William R. was born in 1791, you can see my reasoning for the dismissal. In my Hawkins Family Bible, handed down from my gr gr gf, the family records were written in his hand. I believe the publication date is 1828.

I have shared those records many times. The more the information that gets "out there," the more likely it is that we will find the information we're looking for. Not just for our James, but for all researchers' ancestors. Remember Eaton's Fine Letter Papers' radio commercials: "To get a letter, write a letter"? Of course back then, they said nothing about e-mail, but Eaton was right. We have to get our information goin'. That's why when we first began <code>Hawkins Heritage</code>, the stipulation was for subscribers to send me their research notes, even if they weren't of their own line—it might be for someone else. Then I would compile it into the issues.

SO! The point is, and I think there IS one, I have noticed on maybe four different sites, that James Hawkins, born 1765, and married to Margaret, was son of William Hawkins and Elizabeth Bourne. I have been e-mailing these sites to see where the information came from and if it is documented. Is so, what happened to Sarah Jones?? Most of the time, they say they found it on another site. This could easily not be a case of documentation—but one good reason for not taking for granted what we find from various sources.

Margaret Hawkins, consort of James Hawkins, the elder did not die until 1-4-1838; otherwise, why wouldn't Sarah Jones' name be in the Bible if this is the same James? If anyone "out there" has run across this marriage OR anything pertaining to the couple, please do let me know, okay?

Elijah Hawkins - Elizabeth Scott

Here is the information I have on my Elijah Hawkins:

Looking for the parents/siblings of **Elijah Hawkins**, b. bef .1774 VA, d. bef. 25 May 1840 Orange Co., VA.

Married in Orange Co., VA, 8 January 1807, to Elizabeth Scott, daughter of Reuben Scott and Margaret Cope.

Elizabeth Scott Hawkins, b. bef 1778, d. bef 23 May 1842 Orange Co., VA.

Their children included:

- 1. Beulah Anne 'Julia' Hawkins, b. 14 Oct 1807 VA, d. 29 April 1882 Cabell Co., WV., m. 22 June 1831 Orange Co., VA, to Benjamin Level Perry, son of Peter Leveland Perry and Lucinda Faulconer.
- 2. **John N. (possibly Nelson) Hawkins**, b. 14 Mar 1809 VA, d. 30 April 1893 Trimble Co., KY., m. abt 1831 VA to **Lucinda Holmes**, daughter of Nathaniel Stark Holmes and Clarissa Chandler.
- 3. William A. Hawkins, b. abt 1811 VA, d. aft 1880 Unknown. married three times: 1st married: 23 Nov 1837 Trimble Co., KY to America Balew (Ballou); 2nd married: 9 Nov 1851 Harrison Co., IN to Martha McCoy; 3rd married: 15 Aug 1865 Lawrence Co., IN to Margaret J. Acton.
- 4. Elias Hawkins, b. abt 1814 VA, d. aft 1870 Lawrence Co., IN. Never married. (twin of Elijah)
- 5. **Elijah D. Hawkins**, b. abt 1814 VA, d. aft 1850 possibly Cabell Co., VA (WV)., (twin of Elias). No known marriage.
- 6. **Henry S. (possibly Scott) Hawkins**, b. abt 1820 VA., d. bet. 1855 and 1860 Cabell Co., VA (WV)., m .8 January 1848 Orange Co., VA to **Elizabeth Finnell**.

(Henry's widow, Elizabeth, and 6 children, relocated to Monroe Co., IN by 1860, Elizabeth remarried 28 Feb 1867 in Monroe Co., IN to Issac Grubb, Sr. and bore 3 more children by Mr. Grubb).

Joseph Hawkins died 1725

Could we suggest that this is the Joseph who was a brother of Thomas and Matthew Hawkins, both discussed just above? (last email was Matthew) He left a will in Baltimore County dated December 7, 1725, probated January 13, 1726.

He mentioned having a wife to benefit from the estate during her widowhood, but did not name her children:

- John Hawkins, to share with his brother Augustine in a division of the 100 acre tract called Hoskin's Desire, to be free and receive portions at the age of eighteen.

Talbot County

Edward JAMES left a will in Talbot County, dated June 30, 1702, probated May 30, 1704 which is interesting in that it provides several references to the Hawkins family, and connections to the family in England. Edward JAMES was apparently single, naming his brother-in-law John Hawkins the Executor of his estate. To his sister, Mary (JAMES) HAWKINS, wife of John Hawkins, he left his dwelling plantation of 125 acres, known as Wright's Fortune, and at her death to pass to her son, James HAWKINS.

To his cousin James HAWKINS, (apparently not the same, since the James mentioned just before would have been his nephew), he left the tract called Condon on Red Lion Branch, Chester River, Kent County, and also 300 acres at the head of the

Chester River. In the event of the death of his cousin James, his estate was to oass to his four sisters: Elizabeth, Margery, Mary and Catherine HAWKINS, the first three of whom were apparently in England as noted below.


To his cousins Elizabeth HAWKINS and Margery HAWKINS in England, he left tracts of land: 200 acres of Lane's Ridge, and 100 acres of Castell Town. Cousin Mary HAWKINS in England received 50 acres of Isaac's Chance on Kent Island. Cousin Catherine HAWKINS (residence not stated) received 150 acres of Winchester on Kent Island. Charles LOWDER (relationship not stated) received 300 acres of James Camp in Kent County. It is of interest to the author to note that 300 years later, one of my own favorite cousins was Charles Lowder!

Col. William Gordon Hawkins (Outline)

Col. Hawkins was affectionately known as "Billy G." He came to Pike County, Missouri in 1827, as a youth of eighteen years. He was born in 1809, the son of Harmon Hawkins who settled the homestead.

Harmon Hawkins was born in 1768 and died in 1854. He was married to Jane Robinson. Their children: Benjamin, a soldier in the War of 1812, and died in Bowling Green. Jamima had married John Hardin, who also died in Bowling Green. Billy G. was their youngest child.

The colonel was born in what is now Owen County, KY. His schooling was limited to three months, but he had a natural talent for arithmetic, which helped him in his successful business.

He entered politics, becoming first a constable and deputy sheriff, then becoming sheriff, serving in that capacity for eight years. Colonel Hawkins was later sent to the Legislature until 1860, and then served as census enumerator.

During the Civil War to took the Southern side, but after the war, he re-entered politics, returning to the legislature in 1874. He was known as the "Watchdog of the Treasury." He "rounded out his career in the popular branch of the general assembly of Missouri."

He was a Master Mason and a deacon of the Missionary Baptist Church. The colonel married Martha Bondurant, daughter of Ned Bondurant. She was born in 1810 and died in 1854. Their children: Clifton, died at 19; Edward, Confederate soldier, killed at Corinth; Nanie A. Hawkins McMillan; Martha A. Hawkins Biggs; Col. Richard J.; John Williams; Orwin C.

The colonel was married twice. His second wife was Mrs. Susan MacKay. dau/of Matthew C. Givens of KY. <u>Children</u>: James M. of Portland, OR; Waldo P. of Bowling Green; Callie Hawkins Sanderson; Robert Lee.

Funerary Symbolism

When we're looking through old cemeteries where ancestors reside, we often see different symbols on the stones—gravestones, as they used to be called. After the American Revolution, stone cutters kept ledgers with various designs in them, so families could choose a particular symbol befitting their loved one.

If the deceased was a teacher, the stonecutter carved an open book on the marker. A Bible meant the person had been a cleric or a religious person. Birds: A winged soul; Cherubs: Children; A circle: Everlasting life; Doors or gate: Passage into the next life; Dove: Purity; Hands praying: Signified devotion; An hourglass: Symbol for time; Sickle: The last harvest of death; An urn: Represents the body as a container for the soul; Winged skull: Fleeting death; Forefinger pointing upward: The deceased was in Heaven.

Flowers taken to a graveside; <u>Roses</u>: Perfection; <u>Daisies</u>: Hope for resurrection; <u>Rosemary</u>: Remembrance; <u>Fern</u>: Sorrow; <u>Iris</u>: When clustered, the pointed blades resemble palm fronds, depicting Christ's last journey into Jerusalem.

Trees: <u>Pine trees</u>: One of the world's oldest trees. The fallen needles deter water. <u>Willow</u>: Sorrow; <u>Cypress</u>: Hope; <u>Yew</u>: Represents eternal life.

Gravesites: Many years ago grass growing over graves showed disrespect, so the families kept the soil neatly raked. A barrow or mound of dirt above a burial site kept people from walking over it. Scraped graveyards were typically southern and can be found in all of Texas and in some southern states.

One belief for using shells over a grave is that a departed mother was compared to the sea, with its waves continuing through eternity. White seashells covering her grave symbolize everlasting life. Frequently, the barrow had large shells neatly arranged in horizontal rows or in an artistic pattern.

Broken glass over a site depicted the broken life of the deceased—it also was thought to ward off evil spirits. Surely stray animals would not risk disturbing the grave. Occasionally a lamp was anchored into the base of a gravestone to light the way in the journey of death. A comb or brush may have been left behind for the deceased with beautiful hair. All superstitions or acts of love? No matter, all were respected.

More than one stone for one person? Occasionally this was true. In the late 1890s, a gentleman lost his arm in Hood County. Back then they buried limbs, so of course, they dug a grave in which to place the man's severed appendage. It even has an "armstone." The carving states "The arm of J. E. Arrington, amputated 1897." Some time later, Mr. Arrington passed away, but there was no space next to his arm to be buried. So! He had to be buried an arm's length away.

All of the above is included in *Ghosts in the Graveyard: Texas Cemetery Tales*, written by this editor. You could type in Olyve Hallmark Abbott and it will come up. (No guarantee your computer won't crash.)
