On the 7 day of September 1832, personally appears before me John. M. Hollan, a Justice of the peace for said County of Williams & Frederick, a resident of the County and state aforesaid, aged, Eighty nine years, who being first duly sworn on the holy Evangelist of Almighty God, doth on his Oath, make the following declaration, in Order to Obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7. 1832 - That he was drafted into the service of the United States in the early part of the year 1781 in the County of Charlotte, state of Virginia under Captain Colwell - That he went with him to Prince Edward Court House in the state of Virginia, and was placed under the command of Major Chestnut - Colonel Morris (not recollcted) and then under the command of General Lawson - the British were at that time ravaging the lower Counties of Virginia and North Carolina marching through different Counties and places, the names of which are not distinctly recollcted - for instance We marched to Culpeper Court House in (Virginia), where we joined the army commanded by General Mayo - We then marched to Point of Fork on James River - from thence to Richmond - from thence to Pamunkey and finally the County not recollcted - lay at that place, until discharged at the end of three months service - Was discharged by Capt. Spencer - his discharge is lost, in Maryland - Was not in any battle with the enemy - - Returned to Charlotte, and in a few days, was again drafted under Capt. Thomas Collier - that he was placed under the command of General Lawson - that he marched to Newmarket Springs near James River - at the place he was taken sick, and was with the sick soldiers put under Lieutenant Lyones - and remained at that place, until sometimes after Colwell's surrender at Yorktown - that at that time, he was in the service, something more than three months - but how much less, not recollcted - he was discharged, been released by a verbal, or written discharge, he does not recollct -

He further states that he was born in Essex County, Virginia
in the year 1743, and is now 80 years of age - that he lived in the County
of Albemarle in the time of the American Revolution, and that
he came to Charleston in the year 1806 - when he
became a resident - that on the whole of his life he was in
service of the State (more than one month) -

He hereby relinquishes any claim whatever to a pension
or annuity, except the present, and declares that his name
is not on the pension roll of any State

soldier, and served as he states - and that he is blind and
incapable from bodily infirmities to attend court - and the
said John M. Holland further certifies, that it appears to
him, that Moses Greedy who has signed the preceding
certificate, is a Crippleman, residing in the said County of
Franklin - and that William B. Whitworth, who has also
signed the same is a Resident of the same County, and
is a Credible person - and that this statement is submitted
to Credit. -
