## Spanish-American War Records

- 30—Dr. Lorenzo Freemont Milliken, Co. K, 10th Regt. National Vol., Capt. Thos. S. Crago. During the Spanish-American war the company, under the command of Thomas S. Crago, now congressman-at-large, saw service in the Philippines and was under heavy fire a number of times. During this campaign Company K had its full share in winning for the regiment the title of "The Fighting Tenth."

## World War Record

- 31—GLEN B. De BORD, 650 E. Main St., Chillicothe, Ohio. Age 27. Entered service April 2, 1918. To Camp Sherman. Transferred to Camp Merritt with the 83rd Div., May 25, 1918. To Hoboken June 6, 1918. Embarked ship Aquatania. Landed in Liverpool June 15, thence to Southampton, Eng. (In England 4 days.) Crossed channel to La Havre, France, June 21. (In box cars 5 days' journey to Foulain.) Hiked to Mandrias (here 6 days.) Chaumont one day. July 26, Regt. chosen to go to Italy and Austrian frontier. Box car ride of five days to Noraine, Italy; thence to Torino and Milan. On Aug. 9, reached Villa Franca, Italy, and on to other towns. Oct. 3rd left for Austrian front. Oct. 28, started for the front—Piave River. Crossed river under shell fire at night. In battle Tagliamento River. After Armistice back to Treviso. Returned on S. S. Duca De Austro to N. Y. Harbor. Arrived April 19, 1919. Debarked at Hoboken. Train to Camp Merritt. Discharged here. Arrived home April 19, 1919. See complete record in Ohio State Library, Book M-6221. Geneological section.
- 32—JESSE CLARK, Bolivar, Ohio.
- 33—CECIL R. CLEMMER, Smithfield, Pa. Enlisted on Oct. 16th, 1917; was at Columbus Barrack, Columbus, Ohio, for two weeks, and went from there to Ft. Bliss, Texas. Was in Troop M, 7th Cavalry. While there was at Deming, New Mexico, and at Cloud Croft, and at Ft. Selden, Messilla and at Las Cruces. At these places a few weeks at a time. Fought in the battle of Juarez, Mexico on June 15 and 16, 1919. The U. S. troops were presented with Mexican medals. Honorably discharged at Camp Dix, New Jersey, on Sept. 23rd, 1919. Arrived home on Sept. 26th, 1919.
- 34—ALBERT RAY CRAYNE, Millsboro, Pa., R. F. D. A. E. F. Enlisted in Aviation Dept. Feb., 1918. He was sent to Vancouver. Transferred to Omaha, Neb. Sent to France.
- 35—JAMES LESLIE CRAYNE, Millsboro, Pa., R. D. Serial No. 1,950,097. Age 23. Enlisted at Akron, Ohio, Nov. 5th, 1917. Went to Camp Sherman, Ohio Nov. 7th, 1917. Was in 83rd Division, 332nd Regt. *Headquarters Co.* Sailed from New York on the Aquitania June 8th, 1918. Arrived at Liverpool, Eng., June 15th, 1918, at 10 o'clock A. M. Located in France in small town of Foulain about 40 miles from Chateau Thierry. Drilled most all the time. Started for Italy July 25th, 1918. Arrived at Villa Franca, July 27, 1918, and Sept. 28, 1918, arrived on Piave front and held line for 16 days. Started the drive Nov. 1st, and crossed Piave River Nov. 2nd. In action Nov. 4th at the Tagliamento River. Left Italy Nov. 18, 1918, for Delmacia, and left Delmacia March 5th, 1919. Landed at Genoa, Italy, March 9th, 1919. Left Genoa, March 28th, 1919, and arrived in U. S. April 14, 1919. Went to Camp Merritt, New Jersey. Discharged May 3rd, 1919. Service—Battles, skirmishes and expeditions, Vittorio, Vento, Italy, Oct. 24th, to Nov. 4th, 1918. *Signalman.*
- 36—THOMAS EWING CRAYNE, died in Argonne Forest battle. Born Aug. 25, 1891. Age 27. Enlisted at Akron, Ohio, May 29th, 1918. Sent to Camp Gordon, Ga. Went over seas July 22nd, 1918, from New York City—"Canopia" S. S. Arrived at Liverpool, Eng., Aug. 3rd, 1918, and sent to rest camp "Notty Ash," England. Went to France and served in Toul sector on August 25th and 26th. In *Argonne Forest* Oct. 6th to 12th, was killed here Oct 12th. Commanding officer was captain Howard. Thomas Ewing Crayne buried Oct. 12th, 1918, on the Argonne. He was in Co. B, 60th Inf., 5th Div. A brother's tribute: "He served faithfully and his character was excellent."—J. L. C.
- 37—JAMES BLAIR GEORGE, Uhrichsville, Ohio, R. D. No. 2. Reg. No. 1879. Co. D; rank "Wagoner." To Camp Sherman, April 30, 1918. Started over seas June 13, 1918. Landed July 1st, 1918. Entered service Sept. 1st. Was on four different fronts. Transferred from 83rd Division to 32nd Division. In Ammunition Train No. 308. Sailed on the Carnardonshire. Discharged———. Resides at Uhrichsville, O., R. D. No. 2. Occupation, painter; married.
- 38—JONAS CLYDE GEORGE, Uhrichsville, Ohio, R. D. No. 2. 11th Division, 72nd Infantry. Co. F, Supply Sergeant. Enlisted at Cincinnati, Ohio. June 15, 1918. Transferred to Camp Meade, Md., Aug. 15, 1918. Discharged Feb. 11, 1919, at Columbus Barracks, Columbus, Ohio.
- 39—GLEN MATTESON GIDDINGS, Monmouth, Ills., R. D. 6, and Wilmar, Minn., Box 239. First enlisted in 32nd Eng. at St. Paul, Minn., but came under the draft; had to wait

School, 1914. He was a member of Calvary Evangelical Church in which he was an earnest worker.

- 57—GEORGE E. RICE, 32nd and K St., Vancouver, Wash. Born April 12, 1891. Married. Serial No. 3,645,317. Inducted into the military service, July 23, 1918, from Clarke County, Wash., and sent to Camp Lewis, Washington, the same day. Assigned to 13th Co., 4th Battalion, 166th Depot Brigade. On Sept. 17, 1918, was transferred to R. R. Division, 5th Battalion Engineers, and was sent to Ft. Benjamin Harrison, Ind., and placed in Headquarters Co., 5th Battalion. Oct. 28, 1918, was appointed Sergeant. Transferred to Co. G, 147th Engineers, Dec. 4, 1918. Was discharged Dec. 6, 1918. Col. Willing commanding Engineers.
- 58—CLINTON KENNETH RICE, 32nd and K St., Vancouver, Wash. Born July 4, 1893. Married. Serial No. 2,268,805. I was drafted into the service Sept. 19, 1917, at Vancouver, Wash., from the local draft board of Clarke County. Reported for duty at Camp Lewis, Wash., on the same day and was assigned to Battery A, 346th Field Artillery, 91st Division. Received a warrant as duty sergeant Nov. 1, 1917, in the same regiment. Transferred from Battery A, 346th F. A., to the "Fourth Officers' Training School" at Camp Lewis, Washington, on May 5, 1918. Transferred from this School to the Central Officers' Training School at Camp Zachary Taylor, Ky., June 25, 1918, where I arrived July 1, 1918, and was assigned to the 21st Training Battery of that school. Graduated from the Field Artillery Officers' Training School, Aug. 30, 1918, and received my commission as a 2nd Lieut. in the Field Artillery, Aug. 31, 1918. Ordered from Camp Zachary Taylor to report to Artillery Replacement Depot at Camp Jackson, South Carolina, for duty Sept. 8, 1918. Assigned to 5th Brigade, 1st Provisional Battery. Ordered to the "Officers' School of Fire" at Ft. Sill, Oklahoma, Oct. 2, 1918, and arrived there Oct. 5, 1918. Placed in 41st class on Oct. 6, 1918. Graduated from the "School of Fire" on Dec. 13, 1918. After visiting in the east in Indiana and in eastern Washington, I arrived home in Vancouver, Wash., January 4, 1919. Accepted a commission as 2nd Lieut in Field Artillery Reserve Corps, Feb. 19, 1919. This commission holds five years unless revoked.
- 59—WALTER ERWIN RICE, 32nd and K Sts., Vancouver, Wash. Serial No. 1,832,827, Navy. I was sworn in the *U. S. Navy*, Oct. 2, 1917, and was sent to U. S. Naval training camp at San Francisco, Calif., arriving there on Oct. 4, 1917, where I received my first training. Left this training camp on Nov. 15, 1917, for U. S. Naval Operating Base at Jamestown, Va., arrived there Nov. 22, 1917. On Dec. 10, 1917, transferred by boat to Base No. 2 at Yorktown, Va., where the fleet was lying at anchor. I was placed on board the "U. S. S. South Carolina." On the morning of June 9, 1918, while enroute to Philadelphia we encountered two submarines and are officially credited with sinking one of them. June 12, 1918, I was transferred to "U. S. S. Manly" or Destroyer No. 74, and served about four months on her in the war zone in the North Sea. Was transferred back to "U. S. S. South Carolina," Sept. 9, 1918, and went from New York that evening with convoy of 14 English transports. Returned to U. S. Sept. 26, 1919. On February 18, 1919, we were detailed to do transport work. July 26, 1919, we arrived in Norfolk, Va., after four successful round trips, bringing between 1100 and 1500 soldiers each trip. July 31, 1919, I was transferred from U. S. S. South Carolina to U. S. Ship Philadelphia at Bremerton Navy Yards, for discharge. I was discharged Aug. 14, 1919.
- 60—ORVILLE WAYNE RICE, 32nd and K St., Vancouver, Wash. Born Feb. 24, 1901. Bugler. I enlisted in the service at Portland, Oregon, on the 12th day of June, 1917. Was sent to Vancouver Barracks, Wash., and assigned to recruit Co. No. 2, for Cavalry unassigned. Was transferred to 44th Infantry on the 29th of June, and was assigned to Company D of that Regt. on June 1, 1917. Was appointed Bugler July 6, 1917. This Regt. was transferred to Camp Lewis on Nov. 17, 1917, and attached to 91st Division until it went overseas. Then it was placed in the 13th Division. I was transferred from it on Aug. 11, 1918, to 2nd Co., Dev. Bat. No. 1, 166th Depot Brigade, and I remained with this company until my discharge on the 25th of March, 1919.
- 61—LIEUT. WM. P. SMITH, Jefferson, Pa. Serial No. 1,773,944. Enlisted May 31, 1917, at Pittsburgh, Pa., in 15th Engineers Reserve Corps. Entered service October 10, 1917. 1st Camp, Ft. Slocum, N. Y. 2nd Camp, Camp Dix, N. J. 3rd Camp, Camp Gordon, Ga. 4th Camp, Camp Hancock, Ga. Transferred to Camp Dix, Oct. 16, 1917. Transferred to Officers' Training School, January 5, 1918. Graduated and recommended for commission April 19, 1918. Transferred to Camp Gordon, Ga., May 13, 1918. Assigned to duty with 27th Co. under Capt. Griffith. Received commission as

2nd Lieut June 5, 1918. Transferred to Machine Gun Training Center at Camp Hancock, Ga., June 27, 1918. Graduated from M. G. S., Sept. 6, 1918. Assigned to duty with the 72nd Company, M. T. D., M. G. T. C., Sept. 11, 1918. Promoted 1st Lieut. Sept. 29, 1918. Placed in command of Provisional Co. No. 12, Nov. 6, 1918. Company equipped for overseas and awaiting transportation when Armistice was signed. Discharged Dec. 11, 1918.

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### Honorable Mention of Civil War

Isaac Haver Milliken, son of James Milliken and wife, Elizabeth Haver, resident Tuscarawas Co., Ohio, at outbreak of Civil War. He and his three cousins enlisted and were sent to Nashville, Tennessee. We fail to find his record as given previously in No. 21. He was transferred to Quartermaster Department, Transportation, Army of Tennessee. He returned to his home with Samuel, his cousin. Resides, 1920, at Topeka, Kansas.

Samuel Milliken } County, Ohio.

SAMUEL, aged 20, enlisted at Port Washington, O., in 1863, and entered army 1864, and was sent direct to Nashville, Tennessee. He was not assigned to any Regt. or Co., but was detailed to do teaming. After about one week he and Jonas were sent with their teams to Chattanooga, Tenn., where they were kept in readiness with these post-teams hauling to the Tennessee River. He was discharged Sept., 1865, and returned to his home in company with Isaac H. Milliken, his cousin.

JOHN MILLIKEN, harness maker by trade, was transferred from teamsters department to boss of harness shop at Nashville, where he remained until discharged, December, 1865. He died in 1895.

JONAS MILLIKEN'S record about same as his brother Samuel's, except that the returned home at a later date. He died near Gnadenhutten, Ohio, May 5, 1911.

George O. Prior, son of Nathan Prior, of Muskingum Co., Ohio, (whose brother Samuel H. Prior was killed Dec. 13, 1861), was determined to go to war but because of his age 15 he could not get his father's consent. He went three times and was returned. His daughter writes that when he was 18 he enlisted and served the last three months of the war in Co. H. of the 29th Regt. O. V. I. (We fail to find a record of his service.)

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### Honorable Mention of World War

JOHN CLINTON PRIOR, son of Rev. Cyrus Milligan Prior and wife, Laura Hayes-Prior, was born at Buckhorn Furnace, Vinton Co., Ohio, Dec. 23, 1883. Graduated at Denison College, Granville, Ohio, 1906. Married Edna Lee Cones at Columbus, Ohio, June 7, 1910. They have two sons, John A. Prior and James Cones Prior. Mr. J. C. Prior was called to Washington for service under Secy. Labor Wilson. He removed his family to Washington for the period of the war. He received a *Gold Service Button* for work done in the U. S. Housing Commission. He is an Architect, Contractor and Consulting Engineer, Columbus, Ohio. Residence, 346 East 12th Ave., Columbus, Ohio.

Minnikado and arrived at Hoboken January 29, 1919. Went to Camp Mills. Discharged at Camp Sherman February 15, 1919.

- 47—GEORGE H. McMINN, Jefferson, Pa. Serial No. 2,983,109. Age 27. Private. Enlisted June 28, 1918, (drafted in Detroit, Mich.) Was at Camp Custer, Battery H, 329th Field Artillery, 85th Division, Fate's 160th Artillery Brigade. Discharged at Camp Custer, April 22, 1919. A. E. F., July 31, 1918, until April 2, 1919. Home address is Jefferson, Greene Co., Pa. Present address, 547 Military Ave., Detroit, Mich.
- 48—JOHN RUSSELL MILLIKEN, Waynesburg, Pa., Serial No. 5,128,303. Inducted in S. A. T. C., Sept. 15, 1918, at the University of Pittsburgh, Pa., and placed in 6th Co. After two weeks was selected to go to Central Officers Training School at Camp Gordon, Ga., 32nd Co. Was sent there immediately and in line for an officer's commission when the Armistice was signed. Transferred back to the University of Pittsburgh from which he was honorably discharged. Student Lafayette College, Easton, Pa., 1920.
- 49—DR. BENJAMIN V. McCLANAHAN, Galesburg, Ills. Born April 3, 1892, (married). Entered service while intern at Cook County Hospital, Chicago, Ills. Went to Washington, D. C., and entered Naval Medical School. From there sent to Virgin Islands. After two years on the Island of St. Croix was transferred to Great Lakes Naval Hospital. Discharged October, 1919.
- 50—FRANK HAGAN MILLIKEN, 1009 N. Water St., Uhrichsville, Ohio. Serial No. 5,286,075. S. A. T. C. Age 18 years, height 5 ft. 7 $\frac{3}{4}$  inches. Enlisted Oct. 15, 1918, at Columbus, Ohio, while a student at Ohio State University. Honorably discharged, December 11, 1918. P. O. address, Uhrichsville, O. Student at O. S. U., 1920, Columbus, Ohio.
- 51—CHARLES EDSON NEEDLES, 231 Lewis St., Stillwater, Okla. Serial No. 915,002. Volunteered Sept. 25, 1917, at Enid, Oklahoma. Age 30 years, single. Arrived at Ft. Logan, Colo., Sept. 28, 1917. Sworn into service Oct. 1, 1917. Left Ft. Logan Oct. 5, 1917, arrived at Ft. Leavenworth, Oct. 7, 1917. Assigned to Co. E, 7th U. S. Engineers of 5th Division. Sent on detached service, Feb. 24, 1918, from Ft. Leavenworth to Camp Hill, Va., arriving at Camp Hill, March 3, 1918. Left Camp Hill, April 25, 1918, boarded the ship "Pennsylvania" at Norfolk, Va. Sailed May 1, 1918; landed at Lapalisse port, France, May 22, 1918. Remained on board ship until May 27, 1918. Was sent to Camp Angers, "French Barracks," May 29, 1918. Attached to 116th Idaho National Guard for 5 days. Then returned to the 7th U. S. Engineers at Geivres, June 3, 1918. Was sent from there to Rumlingen, Luxemburg, as a division of Communication of the Army of Occupation. Relieved from the Army of Occupation June 25, 1919. Arrived in Paris, June 27, 1919. Left Paris July 10, 1919, for Brest. Returned on ship "Radnor," July 15, 1919. Arrived in New York, July 28, 1919. Went from ship to Camp Merritt, N. J., then to Camp Pike, Arkansas. Was discharged Aug. 7, 1919. In marksmanship, made Sharpshooter.
- 52—CLARENCE H. NEEDLES, Jet, Oklahoma, Box 155. Serial No. 2,244,994. Drafted Feb. 25, 1918. Sent to Camp Travis, Texas. Rank, Private, 44th Co., 165th Depot Brigade, 90th Division. Transferred to 56th Engineers, Washington, D. C., April 3, 1918. Sailed May 9, 1918, on ship "Wilhelmina" from Hoboken. Arrived at Brest, France, May 23, 1918. Was in battles—St. Mihiel, Meuse, Argonne offensive. At Verdunne (Argonne Forest), when Armistice was signed. Sailed from France, April 12, 1919, on ship "Rijndan" from St. Nazaire, France. Arrived in U. S. at Newport News, Va., Camp Stewart. Discharged May 9, 1919. Served in France 11 months, 15 days.
- 53—ERNEST S. PRIOR, Perkins, Okla. Serial No. 914,146. Enlisted the morning of Sept. 28, 1917. Was at Ft. Logan, Colo., and Ft. Leavenworth, Kas. Transferred to Ft. Leavenworth, Oct. 5, 1917. Rank, Private, Co. A, 7th Regt. Engineers, 5th Division. To Camp Merritt, N. J., morning of Feb. 25, 1918. Left Camp Merritt, N. J., morning of March 15, 1918. To Hoboken, N. J., and took ship "Orduna" (English ship) at Pier 91. Set sail for Europe about March 16, 1918. Arrived at Liverpool, England, March 28, 1918, and docked morning of March 29, 1918. In the afternoon took train to South Hampton, England, and took ship in the afternoon to La Havre, France. Landed at La Havre, France, on the morning of April 6, 1918, and went into tent camp for a night and a day. In evening of April 7, 1918, started to Montigny Le Roy via Paris, arriving April 15, 1918. July 2, 1918, in the afternoon, took train to Gerardmer, France; arrived morning of July 3rd and went into action. Hiked to reserve station in rear of Belforte on front line. Moved to St. Die sector on July 21, on front line service. On August 2, 1918, at 4 o'clock A. M.—"Over the top." Took
