The discovery of French ancestry through our 6<sup>th</sup> great-grandfather Jacques "Jacob" Christman is the subject of this issue's feature article. Jacob, born 1720 in the village of Rothau, France, is credited as being the "immigrant ancestor" for this family line in America. It is safe to say that as a result of his having 16 children, by two wives, that a great many

Americans are descended from this interesting pioneer.

In addition to some general topics of interest for the family historian, the YARBOROUGH surname is featured in the Surname Search section. "Surname Search" displays matches of a surname in our database to the huge resources found at RootsWeb.com.

Don't forget to review the new and updated information in our maternal family database at the Rootsweb World Connect Project, as well as recent happenings with regard to our website at Roots Web's Freepages. A quarterly accounting of our database at Rootsweb shows that five new direct ancestral family lines were uncovered and 183 new individual records have been added.

## FEATURE ARTICLE

### Jacques "Jacob" Christman: From France to North Carolina

Jacques "Jacob" Christman, our 6<sup>th</sup> great-grandfather, was born in the village of Rothau which is now located in the France's Alsace region on the west bank of the Rhine River. Jacob is credited as being the progenitor of the Christman family in America. During the sixty-five years of his life he traveled extensively and accomplished much. Upon arrival in the "New World" he lived in the Pennsylvania counties of Lancaster, Lebanon, and York as well as Orange and Guilford counties in North Carolina. Along the way he was married to two wives with whom he produced an astounding sixteen children!

The earliest known ancestor of our Christman lineage is our 13<sup>th</sup> great-grandfather George Christman. George was likely born around 1549 in Steinthal, located on the western side of the Rhine River in a French valley called Ban de la Roche. Today the towns and villages in which our Christman ancestors lived are found in the French department of Bas-Rhin of the Alsace Region. These communities are now part of the Canton of Schirmeck in the Arrondissement of Molsheim.

The earliest Christman vital record dates to 1632 when, our 12<sup>th</sup> great-grandfather, Georg Christman of Fouday was given the nickname of "Salm" for his thirty years of service to the Count of Salm. During the Thirty Years War, which occurred in France from 1634 to 1648, the Christmans moved from Fouday and Waldersbach to the city of Barr where, our 10<sup>th</sup> great-grandfather, Christian Christman, also known as "Colas Colas", was born in 1637.

In 1664 Christian relocated his family from Barr to the small village Solbach. While the family of Christian Christman resided in Solbach, they celebrated their baptisms in Waldersbach, and buried

their dead in Fouday. This pattern continued until Jean Jacques Christman (1693-1721) moved to nearby Rothau in 1719. It was here that his son

Jacques "Jacob" Christman, "the immigrant", was born in 1720. A mere 8 months later his father Jean Jacques passed away leaving his mother Odille Verly a widow. When Jacob was almost 6 years old his mother married again to Pierre Brullhard who became his step-father.

In 1736 the family made the momentous decision to make the difficult voyage to a new life in the American colonies. This choice was not made by themselves but by many persons from the localities around Rothau. Besides Jacob and his step-father and mother several of his uncles and cousins also left the region. After a two week journey down the Rhine River they arrived in Rotterdam and joined over three hundred other souls seeking a new life in America aboard a ship named the "Princess Augusta". Twelve weeks later they arrived at Philadelphia Pennsylvania on September 16, 1736.

After their arrival in Pennsylvania Jacob and his family moved west into Lancaster County, Pennsylvania. Along with them came the Hans Johann Heckendorn family, fellow voyagers from the "Princess Augusta". On 1 Oct 1742 Jacob married Hans's daughter Barbara Heckendorn at the First Reform Church of Lancaster. For several years after this the young couple lived near town of Warwick in Lancaster County. Their first child a son named Hans Johann was born 3 March 1743 followed by John Jacob on 2 November 1745, Abraham was born in 1747 and a daughter, Anna Marie, came along in February 1749.

Upon the death of his father-in-law, John Heckendorn, in November 1749 Jacob moved to York County along with his Heckendorn in-laws. Here they settled on the Codorus Creek about 10 miles southwest of the new town of York. A second daughter Catharina was born in November 1751. Soon after on December 18, 1751 Jacob was received into the Moravian Church at Crice Creek and Catores located outside of Lancaster.

Around 1753 Jacob and Barbara took their 5 children and moved to the community of Hebron where Jacob received a warrant for 150 acres of land. The old town of Hebron is now a part of the

present day city of Lebanon in [Lebanon County](#), Pennsylvania. While living in this local a daughter Theodora was born on 4 April 1754. Unfortunately in 1755 Jacob's two young children Anna Marie and Abraham died and were buried in the Hebron Moravian Cemetery. A son Daniel was born soon after in May 1756. Two years later grief again struck the Christman family when his daughter Theodora passed away quickly followed by the death of Jacob's wife Barbara on 13 May 1758. Seven months later Jacob married for a second time to Miss [Barbara Kraemer](#). The ceremony took place on 11 December 1758 at the First Reform Church of Lancaster. This was most likely the home church of Barbara's family as Jacob was now a member of the Moravian church. Soon after the first child born to Jacob and Barbara, a daughter named Barbara, arrived on 15 September 1759 to be quickly followed by a son, Balthaser, in December 1760.

Upon his arrival in [North Carolina](#) Jacob settled in [Orange County](#) and stayed for a short period of time near Hillsborough. By about 1765 he had moved on to the Reedy Fork and settled on the

waters of Travis Creek near the settlement of Stinking Quarter, also in Orange County. Here Jacob eventually obtained grants for 400 acres of land. In 1771 the area of Orange County in which he lived became a part of the newly formed [Guilford County](#).

Between 1764 and 1778 eight more children were born to Jacob and Barbara. Jacob was 58 years old when his last child was born and as such many of his off spring were underage when he died in 1785. Jacob Christman is buried in the [Freiden's Lutheran Church Cemetery](#), located near Gibsonville, Guilford County, NC.

Jacob and Barbara's daughter [Rebecca Christman](#), our, 5<sup>th</sup> great-grandmother was born 1766 in [Guilford County, North Carolina](#). She married [Jacob Lineberry](#) also a native of Guilford County with whom she had at least five known offspring. It is through her daughter Rosanna born c. 1800 that our family line continues.

## A "FAMILY TREE" TREE GROWS AT ROOTSWEB



### Five New Direct Ancestor Surnames Added Eleven Generations compiled for our Bacon Lineage Additional data added to Abbott, Smith, Peachee Records

An updated version of our database was recently uploaded to the World Connect site at RootsWeb.com. **183** new records have been added to our database over the past three months. We now have information on **3,123** persons. Since we update the database quarterly to coincide with the publishing of this newsletter our readers are all reminded to take a look at what is new with our family history research. If you do check the website out you may find some new information that will enhance your own research or you may find some errors in ours that we need to know of.

### *Our Maternal and Paternal Ancestors: 350 Years of History in America*

#### New Volumes Added to Our Genealogy Reference Book Library History of Maries County, MO added to family Source Documents

For many of us who have researched our Maries County, Missouri ancestors the book entitled, *History of Maries County*, by Everett Marshall King, has been an essential resource. Fortunately we've been able to add a copy of it to the Maries County "Image Archives". In addition we've placed specific chapters and citations from the book within the following Source Documents family archives: MORELAND, (Moreland surname citations); (Moreland/ Southard/ Hart/ Mosher pp. 596-628); PINNELL, (Pinnell pp.650-656); BROWN and WALKER, (Brown/ Ferrell/ Walker pp. 311-318).

Many new volumes have been added to our [Genealogy Reference Library](#) during the past three months. As a result of this impressive expansion a separate webpage has been created just for books that pertain to USA locations. The [USA Collection](#) webpage now totals over 100 books covering state-wide, county, and local subjects in 20 states.
